# A WORD FROM THE MAYOR

In accordance with the Act to secure handicapped persons in the exercise of their rights with a view to achieving social, school and workplace integration, the City of Vaudreuil-Dorion produces a yearly action plan aimed at increasing the social participation of persons with disabilities. This action plan lists the concrete actions that the City wishes to take in the year 2020. This document also lists what was accomplished in 2019.

Our goal is to make life easier for those with disabilities in every sector of City activity and implement accessibility measures, while respecting our administrative, organizational and financial constraints.

On behalf of the City Council, I can assure you that we will continue providing all of the tools required to meet the needs of persons with disabilities.



# Context

#### LEGAL OBLIGATIONS

- Section 61.1 of the Act to secure handicapped persons in the exercise of their rights with a view to achieving social, school and workplace integration<sup>1</sup> stipulates that government departments, the vast majority of public organizations and municipalities with populations of at least 15,000 inhabitants must produce, adopt and make public an action plan for persons with disabilities.
- In order to reduce the barriers to integration faced by persons with disabilities in the municipality's various sectors of activity, this action plan must describe all measures taken over the past year and identify those to be taken in the coming year. The plan also includes any other element specified by the government upon the Ministère's recommendation.

# Working committee

The action plan is a work tool for implementing universal accessibility within the territory of the City of Vaudreuil-Dorion. This year, the departments most frequently mobilized to work on the ground were included in the composition of the working committee, which is mandated with developing the projects stemming from the action plan, evaluating these projects and ensuring their progress. The role of this municipal committee is to support the coordinator at every stage of the action plan and ensure that integrating persons with disabilities is an organizational concern. In order to meet the integration needs of persons with disabilities, this committee is also mandated with validating the action plan, and the statements included as part of it, with the entire municipal organization.

The Action Plan Advisory Committee, for its part, is composed of nine partners from the public sector and from associations working with persons who have disabilities.

# PORTRAIT OF VAUDREUIL-DORION AND THE MUNICIPAL ORGANIZATION

A city with a rich past, Vaudreuil-Dorion is the embodiment of vitality and modernity. Proud of its cultural and built heritage, it is resolutely looking to the future to offer its citizens a living environment that meets their needs. The City's exponential growth (the population grew from 19,000 in 2000 to 41,019 in 2019), residential and commercial development, and birth rate have been the subject of many media reports.

People are increasingly intrigued by this suburban city that was rarely even mentioned just a few short years ago and is now considered one of Quebec's leading cities. Vaudreuil-Dorion currently ranks 30th in Quebec in terms of population.

This success is due in part to the vision of City Council and to the City's administration, which has established a structured and innovative development plan. Moreover, thanks to the City's strategic location at the junction of Highways 20, 30 and 40, it is a location that is highly favoured by developers.

In order to accommodate the growing population, the City has had to accelerate infrastructure planning. The improvement of the road network, the increase in the hydraulic and purification capacity of the filtration and treatment plant, the expansion of the municipal arena and the construction of a major sports centre are indeed proof of Vaudreuil-Dorion's vitality. In terms of public transit, the territory has two train stations as well as public transit service and express bus service to Montreal. Always seeking to innovative, the City is working on creating a new neighbourhood based on the TOD (Transit Oriented Development) concept in the De la Gare Boulevard sector. The goal of the project is to make the De la Gare sector a housing development where cars are not required for travel to Montreal.

Practiced throughout Europe for several years already, specifically in Scandinavia, and increasingly popular in the U.S., TOD advocates integrated high-density development that combines residences and businesses.



## PORTRAIT OF VAUDREUIL-DORION AND THE MUNICIPAL ORGANIZATION


This concept is articulated around transportation infrastructure, such as the train or metro, where urban design favours walking or cycling. TOD aims to encourage travel using a mode of transportation other than cars, making people rather than vehicles the focus of development. The result is a neighbourhood that is less polluted, quieter, safer and more user-friendly. Indeed, Vaudreuil-Dorion could easily be one of Quebec's model cities when it comes to the application of TOD.

The City's growth, however, in no way detracts it from wanting to preserve its heritage: Église Saint-Michel, Maison Joachim-Génus, Maison Trestler, Musée régional de Vaudreuil-Soulanges, the former Vaudreuil-Soulanges MRC building, Maison Félix-Leclerc in L'anse de Vaudreuil and the Chanoine Lionel Groulx residence on Chemin des Chenaux.

Recognized for the beauty of its landscapes and bodies of water, Vaudreuil-Dorion is concerned with preserving its natural resources. The acquisition of Île aux Tourtes and the property of the Pères de Sainte-Croix is a testament to City Council's determination in this regard. The 50 or so parks scattered throughout the territory and the water games that are so popular with young families all clearly demonstrate Vaudreuil-Dorion's rapid, but well-planned, growth. Without a doubt, the City's expansion is purposeful and inspired, and has provided an enviable quality of life for all of its citizens.

The City of Vaudreuil-Dorion boasts a team of 300 employees who work tirelessly to deliver a range of continuously renewed services to the population.





# A better understanding

According to a Canadian survey on disabilities carried out in 2017:

- One in five Canadians (or 6.2 million people) aged 15 years and over had at least one activity-limiting disability.
- For many of these Canadians, challenges and barriers in their daily lives can prevent them from fully
  participating in society. Having a better understanding of the challenges faced by persons with
  disabilities in personal, professional or economic situations can help guide public policies.

A disability can be defined as:

#### Auditory

Difficulty hearing what is being said in a conversation with another person, in a conversation with less than three people or in a telephone conversation (while wearing a hearing aid, where applicable).

#### Visual

Difficulty reading standard newspaper print or clearly seeing the face of a person from a distance of 4 metres (12 feet) (while wearing glasses or contact lenses, where applicable).



#### Mobility

Difficulty walking half a kilometre or going up and down approximately 12 stairs without stopping to rest, moving from one room to another, carrying an object weighing 5 kg (10 lb) over a distance of 10 m (30 ft) or standing up for extended periods of time (even with help or the use of a specialized device such as a cane or crutches).

#### Speech

Difficulty speaking or being understood.

#### Agility

Difficulty bending over, getting dressed or undressed, getting into bed or out of bed, cutting one's toenails, grasping or handling objects using one's fingers, extending/raising one's arms in any direction (above the head, for example) or cutting food.

#### Pain

Limitation in the amount or kind of activity a person can do due to long-term pain that is constant or comes back from time to time (recurring back pain, for example).

#### Learning

Difficulty learning due to a certain condition (whether diagnosed by a professional or not) such as attention deficit disorder, hyperactivity or dyslexia.

#### Memory

Limitation in the amount or kind of activity a person can do as a result of frequent periods of confusion or difficulty remembering things. These difficulties are often associated with illnesses such as Alzheimer's disease or are the result of a brain injury.



#### Intellectual or developmental disability

Cognitive limitations due to an intellectual or developmental disability such as Down syndrome, autism or mental disorders caused by a lack of oxygen at birth.

#### Psychological

Limitation in the amount or kind of activity a person can do because of emotional, psychological or psychiatric disorders (lasting six months or more) such as phobias, depression, schizophrenia or alcohol/drug use problems.

#### Undetermined

The disability was classified as "undetermined" if the person interviewed answered "yes" to general questions on the limitation of activities but did not answer "yes" to the questions on type of disability that followed (In the 2017 survey, this type of disability was defined as "undetermined")
